

Thomas Lloyd

Born	Unknown

The first record of Thomas Lloyd is his entrance to Trinity College Dublin on 4 June 1725 and he achieved his BA in 1730. He was awarded an MB in 1740 having been examined for his degree in June 1740. On 16 July 1740 he was admitted as a Candidate to the College of Physicians of Ireland, and on the same day was elected as a Fellow.

In February 1742 he was admonished by the College for his conduct which brought about 'great concern' and the 'necessity of reprov[ing] [him] and in this name do admonish [him] to take care of... future conduct'. Sadly, there are no details recorded of what he had done.

As Censor of the College he examined the candidates for new Professorships in surgery and midwifery in 1749. In late October of that year he met the President and others in the Provost's house and recommended Henry Quin (qv) and Nathaniel Barry (qv) for the two Professorships and they were later appointed. Lloyd became President of the College in 1750. He has been described as a 'very eminent physician and gentleman of the finest character'.

He died at his home on Stephen Street on 15 January 1758.
